Some Background on NC Division of Workforce Development







(WIA) Funding Stream – State Level



Designated by President under Federal Law

State of North Carolina

Governor designates DWD as administrative entity and appoints board members to Workforce Commission

Department of Commerce/
Division of Workforce Development

Administrative entity designated by Governor

Local Official (Elected to office by public)

Determine Administrative Entity

Create and appoint local board

Local Area Workforce Board

Local workforce boards, appointed by local elected officials, will plan and oversee the local system

NC Dept of Commerce – Division of Workforce Development

- Key Customer Base: Dislocated Workers; Unemployed and Underemployed Adults;
 Disadvantaged Youth; Economic Development Entities; NC Business and Industry
- Key Federal/State/Local Constituents: US Department of Labor; NC Department of Commerce; NC Commission on Workforce Development; Local Workforce Development Boards
- **Key State and Local Partners**: *NC Community College System*; NC Employment Security Commission
- The Division of Workforce Development is designated by Governor Perdue to be the state administrative entity that receives grant funds under the federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and carries out the responsibilities of the Governor described in WIA legislation.
- Federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Title I funds support programs and activities that
 upgrade the skills of existing workers, prepare youth and other emerging workers to enter
 the labor force, and reconnect dislocated workers and economically disadvantaged persons
 to the workforce. The goal of these activities and programs is to prepare workers to meet the
 job demands of employers in both new and existing businesses.













NC Dept of Commerce – Division of Workforce Development

- Work within DWD is focused on three functional areas:
 - 1. Planning and oversight of WIA funding received by the state annually and from special grants.
 - 2. Staff and support the work of the NC Commission on Workforce development.
 - 3. Align our work and organizational structure with the mission and goals of the Department of Commerce.
- WIA requires the Governor to create and appoint members to a State Workforce Investment Board. This
 is called the NC Commission on Workforce Development Board.
 - The North Carolina Commission on Workforce Development recommends policies and strategies that enable the state's workforce to compete in the current and future global economy. Led by a private sector chair, the 38-member Commission includes representatives from the business community, heads of state workforce agencies, educators, community leaders and representatives from organized labor.
 - WIA also requires local elected officials to create and appoint local Workforce Development Boards in accordance with state criteria and certified by the Governor every two years. North Carolina has 24 local boards that serve the 100 counties in the state. These local boards are responsible for (a) developing local plans for the use of WIA funds that are allocated to them; (b) oversight of the local service delivery system (JobLink Career Centers); and (c) coordinate activities with economic development entities and employers in their local areas.










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Local Workforce Development Boards Involved in GIECP















The WIBs' Role in NC

Outreach and Student Support:

- North Carolina's Workforce Investment Board system funds tuition and other expenses for the Energy Industry Fundamentals classes, the Forsyth Tech Electric Lineman Academy and the Gaston College Nuclear Technology Program
- The WIB system conducts an outreach campaign and uses its <u>www.triadJoblink.com</u> site to register candidates interested in the GIECP program
- WIB career coaches conduct energy career orientation sessions with candidates
- WIBs provide intake and case management services using the Kuder Journey and the WIA case management tracking system
- Career coaches work with applicants from recruitment through employment or referral to another industry
